

t was no surprise that Ofsted were due to call, and on the morning of Wednesday 20th July they rang the bell.

After the horror of the last inspection this was a very different affair.

We had two HMI Inspectors, neither of whom were Early Years experienced, but they were very thorough.

Below is the majority of the Ofsted report. The full report can be found on Ofsted's website. Their parting words were that we were the "Top end of Good and we should be very proud of the Nursery!"

Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

The nursery is a place where children explore and find out about the world through a variety of interesting fun activities. and Children feel secure and valued by the staff. As a result, children have strong attachments to their key workers and thrive in the caring atmosphere.

Parents are positive about their children's nursery. Parents say their children are happy and well cared for and make good progress in learning.

The nursery leaders and staff team are passionate about providing a safe, nurturing and enjoyable learning environment. Children are relaxed and happy. Children play well together and share their learning with each other and the adults who care

for them.

Children enjoy the wide variety of opportunities to 'get messy'. Whether this is outside in the water or in the baby room covered in cornflour paste and paint. Chances to explore and 'find out' abound in the nursery. Children are confident and unafraid to experiment and learn as a result.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

ensure adults challenge the oldest most-able children so that they make the accelerated progress they should, particularly in writing and phonics

ensure outcomes for different groups and cohorts are tracked more closely so that leaders know where to target plans for improvement more precisely

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The setting is led by highly committed and determined proprietors and nursery managers. Together with the staff team, they ensure the nursery harmonious welcoming place for young children to learn and grow. Leaders ensure staff are well trained to care for the welfare and learning of children. Leaders check the effectiveness of training through careful monitoring and act quickly to resolve weaknesses. As a result, the quality of teaching has improved. Leaders have taken decisive action since

last inspection to the improve the areas for development. This resulted the appropriate children's sharing of learning and welfare needs among the staff. As a result, children at Smisby make good progress in learning. Safeguarding is a high priority, leaders ensure staff adhere to the clear systems for child protection. Leaders quick to contact the appropriate external agencies should concerns arise.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Adults plan carefully to meet the learning needs of children across the early learning goals. Planning for learning is shared so that every adult knows what each child's next steps are. Children's newly gained skills are consolidated well in the variety activities children enjoy both indoors and outside. For example, in the baby room, cornflour and water provided endless fun and opportunities for talking and sharing. Babies, adults and the inspector were all covered in the mixture. Older children learn to listen and engage in stories because the adults make story time a pleasure. One group of toddlers sat intently listening to a story about elephants. Adults are skilled in asking questions that support children's critical thinking skills as well their communication and literacy skills.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

In all areas of the nursery,

including the baby room, children play and learn together in harmony. Staff model appropriate behaviour, manners and ways of speaking. This results in children treating each other in the same way. Staff manage the occasional 'fall out' temper tantrum appropriately and sensitively in line with the nursery's behaviour policy. The family atmosphere was best seen in the way children ate lunch together. The oldest children served themselves, chatted happily together and helped each other clear away afterwards.

Outcomes for children are good

All children make good progress from their starting points. However, the most able children are not always challenged to develop their skills quickly enough and as a result, in early phonics and writing skills they do not reach the levels they are capable of. Nursery assessment data for individual children and the work in their learning journals show children working securely within the range typical for their age. Children make particularly strong progress in their personal and social development. Children develop good vocabulary and express themselves eloquently when speaking with each other and the adults. Opportunities to develop creativity abundant. As a result, children's skills managing equipment such as scissors or sticky tape are well developed by the time they leave the nursery.

obile Phones

lust a reminder to all parents that Mobile Phones are prohibited within the black gates of the nursery. This is both a safeguarding issue and a courtesy one. Anyone found using their mobile phone when dropping off or collecting children will be asked to cease their call. It is very important that we have the opportunity to discuss any issues with you at the beginning and end of the day and we would request your full attention for the handover please.

We have upgraded our nursery accounts software and office computer which now enables us to email your invoices and saves on stationery. We hope this will be a much better system and no longer puts the onus on parents to check for bills in the drawers.

Money

id you know that the Post Office is offering FREE life insurance for parents with children under the age of 4?

If you type in the following link, or have a search online www.postoffice.co.uk/lifeinsurance/free-parent-lifecover, you can find out a lot more.

Each parent can get one year's free life cover for £15,000 per child. That means you can both have £15,000 of cover EACH for EVERY child under 4.

Now obviously it is marketing for the Post Office for their Life Assurance policies but there is nothing to pay up front and no banking details collected so it is an opt in rather than an opt out at the end.

Whilst this may seem like it is a little bit morbid it is worth knowing about.

e are very aware of **V** the pressure placed on parents when children are poorly and have to work. We want to reassure parents that we do not send children home without good reason. However every child, when they are unwell, just want to be with their mum and dad and do not want to be in the Nursery.

Illness within a nursery can spread quickly, as those who have witnessed Chicken Pox making the rounds will testify. We must ensure that we do all we can to contain any spread of illness. Toys and equipment are cleaned regularly and if we have outbreaks of particular illnesses we have protocol which ensures toys are sterilised and carpets are deep cleaned.

We would just like to ask you all to review the Exclusion policy relating to illnesses in the policies booklet for parents, which is in the main entrance.

We cannot accept children in the Nursery who are dependent on Paracetamol or Ibuprofen to keep their temperature down. If your child is on prescription medication we will need to have the original prescription label on the outside of the medication so that we can administer any medication to your child. This may seem common sense to you, but you would not believe the requests, and demands, that have been made of us in the past, including the sharing of prescribed medicines.
